This citadel of learning named after the medieval poet of Humanity, *Chandidas*, was founded in 1972 at the village of Khujutipara under Nanoor police station in the district of Birbhum with the motto of imparting higher education to the rural youth. It grew out of the long-standing desire of the people of this underdeveloped area for higher education at less expense of time, trouble and money. It was almost impossible for the local students, coming largely from economically and socially backward classes, to attend the college either at *Bolpur* or *Katwa* as commuters. Realising their plight, some educationists struggled hard to establish this college, defying all odds, mostly financial. The sapling they planted has branched out in many directions, now

The college stands nearly midway between *Burdwan* and Suri (Via Khujutipara) and between *Burdwan* and *Berhampure* (Via *Khujutipara*).

As of communication all the local and long-distance buses ply via Khujutipara, enabling hundreds of students and most of its teachers and employees to commute between their remote homes and the college. The College breathes natural air of human relations among students and the staff as well as beyond the boundary that prides in itself. The College facilitates the students to take-up their desired course to cope with the changing academic scenario. The curriculum at the Degree level and the teaching learning programme followed by the college is under the regulation of the University of Burdwan. In addition to the various subjects offered by the college in the different streams (Arts, Science and Commerce), it also offers NSS & NCC programmes (both for girls & boys). UGC sponsored remedial coaching classes, coaching classes for entry in services along-with career and counselling program have been running to provide added academic support to the students of the college.



ADMISSION:

Admission of students is made only on the basis of their Academic record. The candidates who have passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) or its equivalent examination from any recognized Board or Council or University and fulfil the departmental criteria, if any, are eligible to apply for admission. The applicant should apply on line on the college website www.chandidasmahavidyalaya.org. Admission in Honours will be made through merit basis. Attested copies of the statement of marks and pass certificate obtained by the candidate in Higher Secondary or its equivalent examination along with the attested copy of the admit card of the Madhyamik Examination or certificate of Date of Birth are to be submitted at the time of admission. The applicant must submit income certificate of the family issued by the appropriate authority along with two copies of recent passport size photograph. The applicant must produce the original certificate / mark sheets at the time of admission and he / she has to pay the admission fee along other charges. Candidates coming from other Universities / Institutions must submit their Migration certificates from their respective Universities/Institutions within the stipulated time, otherwise their admission is liable to be cancelled. The students will be admitted on condition that he/she will abide by the rules and regulations of the college. No request for transfer certificate (TC) will be entertained in the case of first year students. Admission in 2nd year and 3rd year is obligatory within July of each academic year.

Fees to be paid on every Monday to Friday (Except holidays). Caution Money (Security deposit money) may be refunded on Wednesday in general. The academic year starts from 1st July and continues up to 30th June of the next year. Fees for the first, second and the third year must be paid by the student and dues must be cleared before submission of the final examination form. Fees once paid cannot be refunded. A part of the caution money may be deducted for any damage done to the college property by the student either voluntarily or involuntarily. Both caution money and mark sheet may be detained by the college if the student fails to pay the dues of the college. The deposit slip of the caution money must be preserved by the student because it has to be produced at the time of refund. This money can never be refunded before the completion of the academic year. If a student fails to collect the caution money within 6 months of the declaration of the final result or within six months of his leaving the college, the money will be forfeited.

PAYMENT



Ensuring class attendance of the students is our top priority. To appear for the University examination students will have to attend at least seventy five (75%) percent of the total classes. The applications of the students who are not regular in attending classes, for scholarship and other financial benefits from Govt. or other agencies would not be forwarded. The college would not consider applications of irregular students for any support (freeship or aid fund) from the college. It is to be noted that the student who attends maximum (more than 75%) classes will be rewarded from the college.

At the beginning of the session, an aptitude test will be taken for the hons. students. Periodical tests are taken by the teachers. Every student is directed to sit for the College examination. Apart from these test examinations organised by the college, a student must clear all the three parts (I-II-III) as per University rules to become a graduate.



LIBRARY



The college library is easily accessible. It has a good 23,000 books and periodicals. It also possesses well rooms both for the teachers and the students separ the Honours courses may collect three books and go students may take two (2) books at a time but they books within fifteen days. All books must be returned the form for the final examination. Our college librated SOUL Soft-ware and students many use the requisit availing E-Resource facility. Students may consult the kind of support in the library if necessary.





The college has raised "Students' Aid Fund" to use support for academic excellence. The fund render assistance to the poor and deserving students. A sfinancial assistance shall apply within three month commencement of their academic session.

Willing candidates may participate in either NSS (National Service Scheme) or NCC (National Cadet Corps) programmes that are held in the college. Through NSS the students can take part in various social works, for example, Literacy and Adult Education Programmes, voluntary services during natural calamities like flood and famine etc. The participating candidates will get certificates which will be of much help for them.





There is a company of wise and efficient teachers who regularly teach the students with utmost care. They also use a number of teaching aids for making lectures more effective and attractive. Their friendly behaviour and sympathetic cooperation & counselling immensely benefit the students.





SEMINARS/DEBATES/PANEL DISCUSSION

Seminar, debates, panel discussions on various subjects/topics are regularly organized and the students are motivated to participate in these events which obviously enhance their horizon of learning. Presence of students is compulsory in any programme organized in the college.


GRIEVANCE CELL, EQUAL OPPORTUNITY CELL & ANTI-RAGGING COMMITTEE

SC, ST, PH and Minority students can also report if they are physically or psychologically harassed by anybody. Established mechanisms like Prevention of Sexual Harassment Committee, Grievance Cell, Equal Opportunity Cell and Anti-Ragging Committee are in full action. All complaints are taken seriously. Appropriate actions against offenders are assured as per rules.

Following democratic ethos the college has introduced online-feedback mechanism. Students may give their feedback on the performance of the teachers, curriculum, college campus and various other issues and amenities by logging into the website. Alumni, guardians may also provide their feedback in the college website. All feedback is periodically reviewed and appropriate steps are taken

The college has initiated an innovative measure in the form of the Mentor system to help and guide students. Each year of every class has its separate mentor. The mentors supervise the overall development of students. They note every academic performance of their students. They put extra efforts for the weaker students. Advanced learners are taken care of as well. They inform their students about various opportunities and different examinations inside and outside the college and different courses outside the college. They take the role of a counselor. Besides, the mentors help the students to come out from their personal problems as far as practicable.





spoken English. Very meager amount of course fee is required to join the course. IComputer Literacy: The College has computer laboratories for departmental activities. In addition to those labs, there is a well-equipped computer lab with Internet connection for general students. A Computer Literacy course is conducted by the college. Interested students can participate in the course. This course is free of cost. The faculty members take these classes in addition to their regular classes.

IPreparation for Competitive Examinations: Although teachers disseminate information regarding career opportunity on various occasions, from the academic session (2016-17), preparatory Course for Competitive Examinations has also been introduced. Interested students may join the course by paying minimum fees.



As per the UGC guideline, the college has constituted the IQAC taking senior faculty members, non-teaching staff and students' representatives along with external experts for ensuring quality in every aspect of the institute. Academic, managerial and official activities are all monitored and due suggestions are put forward before the concerned authority for improvement. Students' grievance and requirements are given priority. Various kinds of facilities are introduced to make the teaching-learning process more attractive. Students' seminars, external expert lectures, debate & quiz competitions, wall magazine, monthly tests, audio-visual classes in smart class room are being practiced under the initiatives of IQAC. This cell also ensures wide circulation of important information among the students. In a word, the IQAC has been set up to monitor the overall quality
